### TREC Practice Competition

### **TREC Schooling Series**

The TREC Schooling Series will take place on July 2nd and August 5th continuing with the first Sunday theme. There will be mounted and unmounted orienteering options as well as a walk/trot division.

The DS Club has put out the t-shirt this year with a pretty little piece of clip that is Jill and Indiana turning through an S-bend




with a smile in the reins. The first order came through in a pretty purple. They have been selling so fast that we will reorder soon. \$20

# Whatcha Reading?

Heney, E. (2021). The Equine Listenology Guide -Essential Horsemanship, Horse Body Language and Behaviour, Groundwork, In-Hand Exercises and Riding Lessons to Develop Softness, Connection and Collection.

In my continued quest to develop knowledge about horses in general, I picked up Elaine Heney's book, The Equine Listenology Guide. Initially, I felt it was more geared for someone who owned a horse, but I stuck with it as it is an easy read. Through anecdotes, case studies, short practical tips, and



exercises, Heney shares her love of horses and her training philosophy.

Chapter topics include building confidence in both horse and rider, liberty work, ground work, and exercises to use your reins less, using your weight and seat more, releasing tension in your body and being more aware of your breathing. Her suggested exercises are short and accessible.

Heney expands on her love of horses and her training philosophy in a 7-part film entitled Listening to the Horse. You can watch it on You Tube (<u>Part 1 here</u>).

Overall, another interesting read that provides insight into horse behavior and strategies for riders to utilize to support their own development in concert with developing a better relationship with their horse.

# **Monthly Challenge - Immobility**

Purpose - To be able to place your horse so that you can move off to do something without them.

**Set-up** - To start find an enclosed quiet location without distractions like a round pen or indoor arena.

Ideal - The horse stands still while you move off.

**Training Tip** - Start by holding the lead directly in front of your horse while you are facing them. In front of their nose put up a hand signal like you would to let your dog know to stay and say whoa. Back up a step or two. If they stay put while you move away, reward them. If they move, gently place them back into position and try again. Work to increase the distance and distractions over time. Be patient. Reward often.

TREC - In the sport of TREC this is a timed obstacle. Two



concentric circles are marked. The rider has 10 seconds to position the horse in the inner circle, and step outside of the outer circle. For maximum points, the horse stands quietly in the inner circle without rider intervention for 10 seconds. If the horse moves or the rider interferes the time is stopped and the score reflects the time up to the change.

# **The Peanut Gallery**

#### "How do you fill in this entry form?"

The first few times filling out an entry form can be a bit confusing. Before you start, be sure to be familiar with the rules of the sport.

Once you have an understanding of the purpose of the sport you will need to read the omnibus pages or the prize list for the show you are entering. A good prize list will tell you 1) when you can enter, 2) the divisions being offered, 3) the fees, 4) the format of the show, 5) the accommodations at the show, and 6) the show specific inclusions and exclusions.

Once you have read this information you are ready to start filling out the entry form. All competitions will need the competitors information including contact information, age group, and emergency contact person. The horses' information will include their age, gender, color, breed, official name, and owner. You will have to provide proof of current vaccinations and COGGINs testing with either a photocopy or an upload of the original. There will also be a place for the owner to sign the entry.

When you enter a show, your entry is specific to this horse and rider. You may not substitute either without permission of the show management.

At some competitions you may ride more than one horse. These competitions include dressage shows, horse trails, and jumping shows. This does not include TREC competitions.

Part of the entry form will be about the division you would like to be in (e.i. open, junior, senior), the classes or levels you are entering, and the associated fees. Often there are other fees like office, grounds, incomplete entry, and post entry which you learned about in the prize list.

There will be a release of liability section that

may be very long. You will need to agree that any issues to arise during the show are your complete responsibility. If you are under 18, a legal guardian will be required to sign. The horse owner will also need to sign here.

If you are under 18 there are different considerations. An adult will need to be on the grounds that is able to act as your legal guardian. Depending on the competition the divisions that can be entered may be limited. In most disciplines there is a minimum age requirement to ride a stallion although many smaller shows do not allow stallions to enter. Be sure that your guardian is also familiar with the rules and regulations as most competitions disqualify competitors that receive unauthorized assistance and it is always so sad when this happens by mistake.

Once all the information is filled out, this form, proof of the current horse records required, and payment in full will need to be sent in by the date specified to complete your entry. Happy Showing!
